Who can vote in the Senate NUI constituency?

All graduates of NUI colleges can vote (see www.nui.ie for list of NUI colleges). Only a minority of NUI graduates has registered to vote, and only 1 in 3 actually vote. Because of out-of-date addresses, many of those registered, do not receive postal ballot papers (6, 000 in 2002 election).

Why should you vote in the Senate NUI constituency?

The Seanad is an integral component of our political system. It is hugely underused. The Seanad has powers to initiate, modify, delay and amend legislation from the Dail. The Seanad badly needs fresh and independent minded voices. Traditionally, NUI representatives have been politically independent and particularly effective members of Seanad Eireann.

New publication 'Women & Cancer In Ireland 1994 - 2001' by The Women's Health Council and the National Cancer Registry

The report shows that the death rate from cancer among women in Ireland is higher than for other western European countries, apart from Denmark. Cancer incidence in women in Ireland is also high and survival for several cancers is relatively poor by international standards.

The report highlights significant differences in cancer incidence, treatment and survival rates among women from different socio-economic groups with those in more disadvantaged groups and older women less likely to receive treatment for cancer. For colorectal (Bowel) cancer, for example, those from more deprived areas are less likely to undergo surgery and have lower survival rates than those from more affluent areas. Older women were found to be much less likely to receive treatment for cancer than younger women.

NWCI are pleased to see that recommendations made contain a call for the urgent need to roll out breast and cervical cancer screening, for which we have been lobbying over many years. Recommendations include:

- Implementation of innovative health promotion strategies to increase women's awareness of cancer, risk factors and symptoms, thereby promoting both healthy lifestyle behaviours and earlier detection

- The necessity to ensure that the treatment and care needs of older women and women from situations of disadvantaged are appropriately addressed.
- Comprehensive screening programmes including that breast and cervical cancer screening programmes must be rolled out to the whole country for women in appropriate age groups as soon as possible as well the implementation of a pilot programme for colorectal cancer screening.
- The need for more research

Trafficking of Women for Sexual Exploitation: A Seminar on the International and Irish contexts

This seminar, funded by the Department of Justice, Equality and Law Reform, took place on 3 April in the Fitzwilliam Hotel in Dublin, and was chaired by Ailbhe Smyth, Director, Women's Education, Research and Resource Centre, UCD.

Below is a summary of the papers delivered at the seminar.

International perspectives

Professor Liz Kelly, CBE, Director of the Child and Woman Abuse Studies Unit, London Metropolitan University, gave a presentation from a global perspective, outlining the challenges posed by global patterns of trafficking, and recommending the UK Home Office's Prostitution Review that clearly identifies the demand for women and children for sexual exploitation as the cause of trafficking

Mary McPhail, Secretary General, European Women's Lobby, gave a presentation from an EU perspective, illustrating the scale of this form of violence against women across Europe, identifying the root causes, and giving practical examples of preventative measures e.g. Swedish legislation that criminalises the purchase of sexual services.

A Q&A session raised many questions and comments, including how feminism is viewed; the resources needed to address the issue v what feminists can do with few resources; trafficking and prostitution at the 2006 the World Cup; human rights violations; and the Swedish model of legislation. Sweden provides a positive way forward, in that as well as addressing the demand side of prostitution; a package of measures (e.g. training) was introduced to support women. This proved highly effective, and the example was given of Malmo in Sweden, where at the time of the introduction of the legislation, 76% of women left prostitution.

National perspectives

Pauline Conroy, Ralaheen Ltd (Author of Trafficking in Unaccompanied Minors: the case of Ireland, IOM) gave a presentation on the findings of her research, including current research on the trafficking of children into and within Ireland. Julia Long (MA graduate, UCD) gave a presentation based on her Masters research dissertation on trafficking of women in Ireland, within a global economic context.

A Panel discussion on current knowledge, policy and practice in Ireland was chaired by Grainne Healy, Chairwoman of the EWL Observatory on Violence against Women. Monica O'Connor co-author of 'Making the Links between Prostitution and Trafficking: A Briefing Handbook' (with Grainne) gave an overview of the Handbook and how it can be used by activist. The Handbook is available by email from the NWCI (contact Michelle Scanlon for further information).

Gerardine Rowley, Assistant Director, Ruhama, spoke about their services that support women who have been prostituted, including a number of women trafficked into Ireland.

Detective Sergeant Paul Molloy, Operation Quest, described the results of that Garda investigation in 2003, and the ongoing monitoring of lap-dancing clubs here.

Finally, Joanna McMinn, Director, National Women's Council of Ireland, described the work of the Irish Observatory on Violence Against Women and the recently launched 'Buying Sex is not a Sport! Campaign against the sexual exploitation of women and girls during FIFA World Cup 2006.

NWCI WORLD CUP CAMPAIGN

"Buying Sex is not a Sport"

The NWCI 'Buying Sex is not a Sport' Campaign was launched on March the 9th in the National Library of Ireland on Kildare Street in Dublin.

The event allowed the NWCI to join with many other women's organisations around Europe in launching similar campaigns against Germany's sexual exploitation of women during the up-coming FIFA World Cup 2006 this summer.

The Campaign was primarily launched to raise awareness of the trafficking in women for prostitution, in the context of the up-coming FIFA World Cup.

The aim of the NWCI campaign

The aim of the campaign is to raise awareness of the links between trafficking in women and prostitution during major international

sporting events; and the human rights abuses and violence associated with this practice.

We need YOUR support with more on-line signatures!

A key aspect of the campaign has been the launch of an on-line petition in support of the campaign. The petition can be found at www.nwci.ie and we encourage all our members, who have not yet signed the petition, to do so and to encourage your colleagues, family and friends to do the same.

We need as many signatures as possible, before April 27th 2006, when we will present the signatures that we have received to Minister for Justice Michael McDowell TD. An EU Council of Ministers Meeting (Justice & Home Affairs) will take place in Luxembourg on April 27th & 28th. Minister McDowell will attend this meeting and, as part of the campaign, we have asked that this issue be placed on the agenda for that meeting. **We urge you therefore to sign the petition and to encourage others to do so.**

Background to the Campaign

From June 9 – July 9, 2006, 12 German cities will host the FIFA World Cup Games. Approximately 3 million fans will attend the games. All estimates foresee an important rise in the commerce of women's bodies, which cannot be met by German women or women from the EU alone. The owners of small and mega-brothels and sex industry infrastructures, including 'performance boxes', in the 12 Germany cities are ready to make a maximum of profit during this period with the massive influx of male supporters.

Performance boxes are wooden "sex huts" that look like toilets have been built in fenced-in areas the size of a football field, with condoms, showers and parking for the buyers and a special focus on protecting their 'anonymity'. For this, the private sex entrepreneurs' have had to receive authorisations from the local governments.

What is the NWCI's position on this situation?

The NWCI views prostitution as sexual exploitation, in which women – legally or not – are physically and psychologically harmed. The NWCI strongly opposes that women's bodies are treated as commodities that can be bought and sold.

The NWCI strongly asserts that:

- Buying sex is not a sport. It is a sexual exploitation in which women are physically and psychologically harmed and women's bodies are treated as commodities to be bought and sold.
- Treating women's bodies as sexual commodities violates international standards of sport that promote equality, mutual respect and non-discrimination. FIFA President, J.S Blatter 'acknowledges the prominent role of sport and especially football, as a vehicle for delivering clear and firm messages to eradicate the huge blights undermining society around the world'. The NWCI ask: 'How will the FIFA World Cup Games help eradicate the blight of trafficking and sexual exploitation?'

What is the NWCI doing about this situation?

On March 9th, the NWCI publicly called upon

- all sporting bodies, including FIFA and the Football Association of Ireland (FAI) to publicly disassociate themselves from the sexual exploitation of women around sporting events and to affirm the dignity and human rights of all women
- the Irish government to put the issue of the trafficking in women for prostitution and the human rights abuses and violence associated with that, on the agenda of the next EU Council of Minister's Meeting (Justice & Home Affairs) on April 27th & 28th 2006.
- all concerned individuals, groups and organisations in Ireland to join in signing this statement in protest of the trafficking in women for the FIFA World Cup 2006.

Responses from FIFA and the FAI

We have yet to receive a response from the Football Association of Ireland and from FIFA. However, FIFA did respond to the EWL by saying: 'Although we deplore human trafficking and have full understanding of your request, it is unfortunately not possible for FIFA to start other campaigns than the specific campaigns that we have decided to focus on (FIFA have dedicated the 2006 World Cup to raising awareness about children's rights, peace and anti-discrimination), in connection with the FIFA World Cup, independent of the relevance or good intention of their causes.'

Support for the Campaign

We have received great support and encouragement for the campaign. We have collected approximately 700 on-line signatures. These signatures have come from around the world, as well as from around the country. We have many petitions around the country that people have taken to collect signatures in hard-copy format. These have yet to be returned to us.

The following MEPs have written to us showing their support: Gay Mitchell MEP, Liam Aylward MEP, Mairead McGuinness MEP and Marian Harkin MEP.

NWCI AND THE MEDIA

International Women's Day 2006

Following on from last year's International Women's Day discussion on a 'women's political caucus', the theme of 'Celebrating Women's Leadership' was chosen for IWD 2006.

Caroline Casey, Founder of the Aisling Foundation and recipient of a Young Global Leader 2006 accolade acted as chair for an interesting panel discussion where speakers spoke of their own experience of leadership as women, in Ireland. Caroline injected energy and enthusiasm into the discussion, as she spoke of her experience of leadership, both as a woman and as a woman with a disability.

Speakers included: Salome Mbugua, National Director, AkiDwA; Maura Walsh, Manager, Duhallow Women's Forum; Zoe Trevaskis, a young student from Dail na n'Og and Catherine Murphy, an Independent TD from Kildare. Each speaker spoke of the challenges they faced in becoming a woman in leadership at a local, regional or national level. The group discussion also allowed the NWCI to understand how best we can move towards fully supporting members and women in general in achieving positions of leadership in Ireland.

We received good media coverage in the Irish Times and the Irish Examiner. We also conducted several interviews with local and regional radio around the country.

We have received very positive feedback from those that attended the event and we hope that those in attendance, who were not in positions of leadership, received encouragement and hope from the discussion, that leadership can be a true, attainable possibility for all women. We can now look forward to moving on to planning for IWD 2007 very soon!

The NWCi World Cup Campaign Launch

The NWCi 'Buying Sex is not a Sport' Campaign was launched on March the 9th in the National Library of Ireland on Kildare Street in Dublin.

The event allowed the NWCi to join with many other women's organisations around Europe in launching similar campaigns against Germany's sexual exploitation of women during the up-coming FIFA World Cup 2006 this summer.

The Campaign was primarily launched to raise awareness of the trafficking in women for prostitution, in the context of the up-coming FIFA World Cup.

The Council were honoured to have a distinguished panel of speakers at the launch of the Campaign. Maurice Manning, President of the Irish Human Rights Commission chaired the event. Grainne Healy, Chairwoman of the European Women's Lobby (EWL) Observatory on Violence Against Women; Kevin Lalor, Chairperson of Ruhama and Joanna McMinn, NWCi Director made up the panel of speakers.

Maurice Manning congratulated the NWCi on this initiative and said that it was one that should be taken seriously, in particular by men and by politicians. He commented that; 'the stark fact is that trafficking in human beings constitutes one of the most severe violations of human rights in the world today' and said that the World Cup offers an opportunity to highlight the reality of trafficking and a gives us a chance to do something about it.

The Council is grateful for the time and expertise that the speakers gave to the launch. We received very strong, positive media coverage on television and in print. The major broadsheets carried the story, as did every tabloid newspaper.

We followed this media coverage by writing letters to the Irish Times, the Irish Examiner and the Irish Independent regarding the campaign. The Examiner did not print the letter from Joanna McMinn, but we received a huge response, by way of on-line petition signatures, following the Irish Times and Irish Independent's printing of the letter. Joanna continued with further media coverage as a result of the printed letters.

Violence Against Women Programme Pavee Point

Brochure "Challenging Misconceptions of Violence against Women from Minority Ethnic Groups, including Travellers, in Ireland"

The brochure was developed by the Violence against Women Programme in Pavee Point in consultation with members of other minority ethnic groups such as AKIDWA – African Women's Network and the NCCRI.

Service Providers and support services in Ireland which includes the judiciary, the Gardaí, GPs and Accident and Emergency services often are unaware of the difficulties minority ethnic women have in accessing their services. This brochure highlights the need for anti-racist training and codes of practice within the context of providing more diverse and culturally appropriate services to women.

The misconceptions that are being addressed in the brochure have been identified by women from different minority ethnic backgrounds. The universal elements of gender-based violence are challenged to encompass sexism and racism which minority ethnic women experience when accessing services.

The second part of the brochure provides recommendations and ideas for service providers in relation to best practice to meet minority ethnic women's needs and to work in partnership with minority ethnic women.
