Women's Human Rights Alliance (Ireland) Oral Statement 19th Session of the UN Human Rights Council March 15th 2012 Universal Periodic Review - Ireland

Madame President,

The **Women's Human Rights Alliance** is an alliance of human rights organisations and individuals promoting the human rights of women in Ireland.

- 1. We welcome the Irish Governments' acceptance of a number of important recommendations from the UPR hearing in October 2011.
- 1.1 We are, however, greatly concerned by the rejection of six recommendations¹ on Ireland's restrictive regulation of abortion. These recommendations echo the criticisms made by three UN treaty bodies² and the recent call by the UN Special Rapporteur on the right to health for the decriminalization of abortion³. Their rejection casts serious doubt on Ireland's commitment to women's reproductive health rights.
- 2. We are gravely concerned that in accepting the Thai recommendation⁴ for a statutory inquiry and compensation scheme for women and children victims of abuse, there is no mention of the women survivors of Ireland's Magdalen Laundries who have been denied

reparation⁵.

- 2.1 We call on the Government to comply with the recommendations of the UN Committee against Torture⁶ and Irish Human Rights Commission⁷ to institute a statutory inquiry and compensation scheme for the Magdalene Laundries abuse.
- 3. We are concerned at the Irish Governments response to Austria's recommendation for "full implementation and an independent assessment of The National Women's Strategy⁹".
- 3.1 We acknowledge the current internal Government review¹⁰, but believe that an independent non governmental review would enhance the Strategy in the current economic crisis reflecting not just achievements, but identifying the measures required to protect and advance women's human rights.
- 4. We welcome Government's acceptance in principle of the terms of **The Council of** Europe Convention on Preventing and Combating Violence against Women and **Domestic Violence**¹¹ and urge Government to sign the convention as recommended by Austria¹² and implement it as a matter of urgency.
- 5. France recommended a gender parity law to increase women's representation in politics¹³. We welcome the legislation on candidate quotas¹⁴ but believe the quotas to be un-ambitious. The Constitutional Convention should be tasked with implementing gender sensitive reform of Irish political structures.
